I would like to thank those families who attended the Macmillan Coffee Morning last Friday. We raised £42 for this cause.

Last week, Miss Peace and Mrs Atkinson organised different school trips for our pupils. Mrs Atkinson and some of our staff team, took our year 2 children to the Yorkshire Sculpture Park where they observed the different sculptures looking at pattern, texture and the different materials used by artists. Staff at the Yorkshire Sculpture Park commented on year 2's excellent behaviour, good problem solving skills during team work activities whilst also being very creative! Well done year 2 – we are very proud of you!

Ten children from year 5 visited the Asda headquarters in Leeds to take part in a programme with Asda and the United Nations Sustainable Development Goals initiative. Communication Policy

Please take time to read the communication policy attached to this newsletter. You will find information on who you can speak to regarding different areas and how we will communicate with you.

Stand-alone letters will go out to parents if they are important and time limited or where there are new initiatives or changes to systems.

King's Meadow Messages newsletter will go out regularly across a half term with messages, reminders, local context information, attendance and safeguarding information.

We understand that parents have expressed concern with Class Dojo being removed, however, this is a Trust decision due to a number of issues that staff and parents had across all schools not just King's Meadow. By publishing our communication policy, we hope this supports parents to know who to speak to. We ask parents to always speak to the class teacher first, then phase leader – Miss Peace, Mrs Atkinson or Mrs Moore with issues concerning your child. These communication layers support open door communication. We hope you find this policy supportive.

Punctuality and Attendance Layers

We have been closely reviewing our attendance and punctuality systems across school. Parents have told us that the new position of the late door is now better. We do hope the use of this will diminish in future to support children being in school on time for their 'Meet and Greet'.

Last week, you will have received a letter regarding proof of appointments as well as this we have looked at how we monitor individual attendance and punctuality. Where school has serious concerns about the impact of a child's education as a result of minutes/days of learning missed, we will now use our attached punctuality and attendance layers system with different school or Trust staff taking responsibility. Should your child's punctuality or attendance be an ongoing concern this year you will need to meet with specific staff.

Safeguarding is a priority here

Local area – safeguarding concern

In recent months, Wakefield has seen a rise in the use of ketamine among young people. Often mistaken as a "party drug," ketamine poses serious risks to both physical and mental health. What starts as recreational use can quickly spiral into dependency, with long-term consequences including bladder damage, memory loss, anxiety, and depression.

Known on the streets as "K" or "Ket" or "Bezzle" ketamine is a powerful anaesthetic with hallucinogenic effects. It can leave users feeling detached from reality, vulnerable to injury, and unaware of their surroundings. Regular use can also lead to something known as "K-bladder," a painful and potentially irreversible condition that affects the urinary system.

The increase in ketamine-related incidents across Wakefield highlights a growing concern for the wellbeing of our young people. But there is hope, and support is available – should you wish to speak to someone about this and find help, please ask to speak with one of our school
